

A Message from our Pastor



Hi, everyone! As you probably heard me announce last weekend at Mass, we are getting Fr. Patricio Aborde as our parochial vicar this Wednesday, October 18th. Fr. Patricio is a missionary priest from the Philippines. Bishop Malesic is having several missionary priests from the Philippines come to serve in the Cleveland Diocese. Where we experience priest shortage in the United States and Europe, there are other parts of the world like the Philippines, Africa, and parts of India that have an abundance of vocations. In this part of the world we are familiar with a Christianity that is struggling to hold faith in a post-Christian society. There are parts of the world where Christianity is flourishing. In times like this when we see our society struggle to hold Christian values (really struggle) we remember the larger Church that really expands across the whole world at times has a different experience. In those areas that are experiencing an abundance of faith and vocations the Church "shares her resources" to help the weaker areas.

In Cleveland we are very blessed to have on average 3-5 young men ordained to the priesthood every year from our own diocese. All things considered we are not doing that badly. We really do have a vibrant seminary with great young men discerning the priesthood! We have a new seminarian, Nate Menkhaus, who will be speaking at all the Masses for priesthood Sunday in two weeks. I know we have other young men at our parish who are thinking of this vocation. Please pray for them and encourage them if you feel that they would be good priests.

Even with the Cleveland Diocese having around 50 men in the seminary, we are still in need of some help with priests in our diocese. Bishop Malesic is having some missionaries come over to serve in a few parishes, hospitals, and other ministries.

Fr. Patricio was ordained in 1997. I would imagine he is in his low 50's. He served as a priest in the Greensburg Diocese in Pennsylvania around 2015 for five years. I talked with Bishop Malesic this past week at our priest convocation and the Bishop personally knew him from Greensburg and said really positive things about him. I know one of the main concerns is whether he can speak English well and the Bishop assured me that should not be a problem.

We will offer a light reception after each Mass October 28th and 29th for you all to be given a chance to meet and welcome Fr. Patricio and Nate (our new seminarian) to our parish. Please pray for them and give them a warm welcome to this great parish!

Lastly, remember the month of October is Respect Life Month. Every human life is good, beautiful, and sacred in God's eyes and so should each human life be in our eyes. In particular, the life of the unborn is being greatly threatened even more now than ever in Ohio. It is extremely important that we pray and vote "no" on issue 1 this November 7th. Here are a few very important words from the Ohio Bishops for us:

"The Catholic Conference of Ohio firmly opposes Issue 1, which would enshrine the "right" to abortion in the Ohio Constitution. This extreme amendment endangers the health and safety of women, threatens parental rights, and allows for abortion through all nine months of pregnancy.

The Catholic Church has always advocated for and acted to protect the most vulnerable in society, including the indigent, migrants, and preborn children in the womb. We will continue to do so by explaining the harms Issue 1 poses to women, parents, and babies with Catholics and all people of goodwill across Ohio and encourage a "no" vote on this egregious proposal. Ohioans deserve just laws which provide expansive resources and accompaniment to mothers and young families, not proposals like Issue 1 which does nothing to support women."

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT ISSUE 1



What is Issue 1?

Issue 1 is a proposed amendment to the Ohio Constitution that would endanger the health and safety of women, threaten parental rights, and allow for abortion through all nine months of pregnancy. Ohioans will vote on November 7, 2023, whether to make this change to the Ohio Constitution.

What would Issue 1 do?

Put women at risk:

 Health and safety standards in Ohio could be eliminated. Doctors could no longer need to examine a woman or explain the risks of the abortion procedure ahead of time.

Threaten parental rights:

 A fifteen-year-old could have an abortion without her parents knowing. Current Ohio law requires parental notification and consent before a child under 18 can obtain an abortion. These parental right protections could be removed as they directly conflict with the amendment which would allow all individuals, including minors, to make their own reproductive decisions.

Allow for abortions of fully formed babies:

 Abortion would be legal through all 9 months of pregnancy. Physicians at an abortion clinic could use a woman's age or emotional well-being as a reason to perform an abortion in the 3rd trimester.

Would abortion be illegal in Ohio if Issue 1 does not pass?

If Issue 1 does not pass, abortion would still be legal in Ohio until a baby's heartbeat can be detected. This standard was challenged in court and placed on hold, allowing for abortions up to 22 weeks as of September 15, 2023. Current laws that protect the safety of women and parental rights would stay in effect.

Doesn't Issue 1 simply restore Ohio back to when Roe v. Wade was in effect?

Issue 1 goes dangerously beyond what was legalized in the Roe v. Wade ruling. It opens the door to remove important health and safety measures that protect women, threatens parental consent and notification of any minor seeking an abortion, and allows for abortion through all nine months of pregnancy.

Will miscarriage care or ectopic pregnancy treatment be denied if Issue 1 fails?

The passing or failure of Issue 1 will have no effect on the care a pregnant woman receives when her life is in danger, even if the treatment results in the loss of life of her unborn child. There is a fundamental difference between an elective abortion and the care provided after a miscarriage or for ectopic pregnancies. Women can always receive lifesaving treatment, including in Catholic hospitals. No law restricts this care in Ohio or any other state in the country.

How is the Church helping pregnant women in need?

For decades, numerous Catholic social service agencies, in collaboration with faith-based and secular organizations, have assisted pregnant women in need with material resources and personal accompaniment during pregnancy and after their child is born. Project Rachel helps those struggling post-abortion. Every woman should be able to depend upon a community for support and the Catholic Church remains committed to woman in need.

THIS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT...

THREATENS PARENTAL RIGHTS

By using "individual" instead of adult or woman, anyone under the age of 18 could have an abortion or make any other reproductive decision without their parents' consent or notification.

PUTS WOMEN AT RISK

Current Ohio laws* require abortion providers to explain procedure risks and ensure access to hospital transfer if needed. These health and safety standards could be seen as a "burden" and be eliminated, making it even less safe for women seeking an abortion.

ALLOWS ABORTIONS THROUGH 9 MONTHS OF PREGNANCY

In U.S. law,** "health" includes age or physical, emotional, or psychological well-being. This means a woman's age or emotional health could be cited to justify aborting a full-term baby. An abortionproviding physician would decide when a baby could survive outside the womb, leaving no clear protections for preborn children.

IS MISLEADING

Referring to "miscarriage care" promotes a myth that a "right to abortion" is necessary to preserve care for miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. This is false. Catholic hospitals have always provided comprehensive miscarriage care and will continue to do so regardless of the outcome of this vote.

ARTICLE I, SECTION 22

The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety

- Every individual has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions, including but not limited to decisions on contraception, fertility treatment, continuing one's own pregnancy, miscarriage care, and abortion.
- 2. The State shall not, directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either an individual's voluntary exercise of this right or a person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right, unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.
- However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health.
- 4. As used in this Section, "Fetal viability" means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis"; and "State" includes any governmental entity and political subdivision.
- This Section is self-executing.
