### **A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR**



Hi everyone! Last weekend we had an amazing retreat for our Life Teen youth group. We had 72 teens come to the Hiram House for a two-day retreat. They seem to have a very blessed few days on retreat. I really enjoyed being a part of it where I was able. I came to celebrate Sunday Mass for the teens and their parents to close the weekend. Right before that I was able to hear them share some of the graces they experienced on retreat. I was taken back by how many talked about the profound experience they had being prayed over, and going to adoration. Many of them also mentioned how much they enjoyed their small groups. In small groups they are given a chance to have discussion about a talk or given topic with a group leader and this gives them a chance to open up about their lives and what they are experiencing.

I found it really powerful that they had these great experiences in just basic Christian practice – prayer, adoration, small groups. There is nothing complicated about this but it just demands making the time for it. Retreat offers that time for them and they really have the chance to go deeper with God, and open up more about their lives. We really want these basic practices to be foundational for their young lives. I would want them to build there lives from this foundation of having quality time with Jesus, and open discussion with people they trust. These are the basics we really want all of our parishioners to experience. Do you have quality time with Jesus on a regular basis? Have you ever been prayed over? Do you have a group of brothers and sisters in Christ that you can open up to about your life?

Advent is coming up in two weeks. This really is a perfect time to re-establish these basics in our own lives. We are offering a few things this Advent to help. First, I will be offering a prayer workshop Wednesday, December 6th from 6:30-8pm. My hope with this is to teach on prayer for 45 minutes and then to have 45 minutes to lead us through prayer. One of my most important responsibilities as a parish priest is to help people to pray better in their lives. If I can give you anything it would be to help you grow in your relationship with Jesus, learn to listen to Him, and help you to open your life to Him. This is one of the ways I can best help you as your spiritual father and pastor. Many of us know about Jesus, and are familiar with certain passages from Scripture or the Mass but have very little practice in communicating well with the Lord. My hope in this prayer workshop is to begin to establish or reestablish this fundamental part of being Christian which is to be in a real relationship with Jesus and to really have a prayer life.

The second opportunity in Advent will be the evening of praying in the Spirit. This is called "outpouring." Having a

real encounter with the Holy Spirit is another fundamental of Christian living. Often those graces we receive at Baptism and Confirmation go dormant since we are really not open to the Holy Spirit. On retreat the teens had the opportunity to be prayed over and really allow the Holy Spirit to stir within them once again. Having this encounter with the Holy Spirit is life-changing. God really can heal our hearts, and heal us from the effects of sin. Again, we really just to need to be open to it and this evening of outpouring is a great chance to re-open our hearts to the Holy Spirit in prayer and praise of God.

The third opportunity for this Advent is the sacrament of reconciliation. Making a good confession has instrumental to Christian living. Jesus calls us to repentance and forgiveness of sins. This is basic to the Gospel and to us getting our lives back on track. Jesus healing and forgiving us through this Sacrament relieves us of our sins and grants us that peace and freedom of heart we all yearn for. Please see our times offered for confession and really try to give yourself to Jesus in this sacrament.

Have a very blessed Thanksgiving week! I hope and pray you can have quality time with your family for this holiday. And I look forward to beginning Advent with you in a couple weeks!

#### Notes from the Blue Army

In 2001, the late Fr. John Hardon wrote, "The month of November has been dedicated to the Poor Souls. No doubt the reason is because November is the last month of the liturgical year, even as purgatory is the last stage of human existence before a soul reaches heaven. The Poor Souls are the souls of those people who died in the friendship of God. But they still have some suffering to undergo for the sins they had committed during their lives on earth. In order to understand why the Poor Souls are in purgatory, as Catholics we should know what we believe about the double effect of every sin. Every time we sin we lose more or less of God's grace. This we call "guilt." Every time we sin we also incur a debt of pain. This we call "penalty." Mortal sins are called mortal because they deprive the sinner of sanctifying grace and the right to heaven. Mortal sins also incur the debt of eternal punishment. When mortal sins are forgiven in the sacrament of penance, sanctifying grace is restored and the debt of eternal punishment is removed. But normally there is still temporal punishment to be expiated. Moreover, venial sins always carry with them a debt of temporal punishment, which is more or less remitted, depending on a person's spiritual dispositions.

This immediately tells us that because we are sinners we must expect to suffer in expiation for our sins. The choice we have is between patiently suffering here on earth or suffering in purgatory after our bodily death."

Our gospel today tells us that Jesus uses the parable of the talents to remind us that we must be ready to make good use of the gifts He has given us and they are indeed many. God has given each one of us a different talent and probably more than one according to our various abilities. We look around us and see mothers, fathers, teachers, priests, children, grandparents, doctors, those who are retired, the elderly in nursing homes and many others who still serve God and church in some capacity. These are just a few of the talents at our parish family and in our world. The Lord tells us that the Master will come for an accounting of how we used those gifts. The first two servants in the parable returned more than they received, allowing the Master's possessions to grow. The third buried his and gained nothing. God expects a return on his investment, in us. If we want to touch God, we need to take care of the poor and the needy; when we serve them, we are serving God as well.

Thanksgiving is this week. Maybe we can set aside a little time every day to reflect on the blessings we have been given. God showers blessings on us, day by day and week by week drawing us closer to the source of life: Jesus present in the bread and wine that we receive when we come to this church. And for this we are forever "thankful". Wishing all a Blessed Thanksgiving. Reminders: Christmas luncheon is December 15. Doors open at 11:30 AM. # The Book of the Names of the Dead

#### REMEMBERING THE DEAD


Christian communities remember the names of their dead. These names are heard in the Prayer of the Faithful during Mass and in the chanting of the Litany of the Saints at the Easter Vigil. The names of the deceased are seen on holy cards, memorial cards, and grave markers. Masses are prayed for the repose of souls. These rituals and practices serve to keep the memory of those who have gone before us in faith present in our minds and hearts

#### MONTH OF ALL SOULS

The origins of the solemnity of All Saints (November 1) and the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls Day, November 2) are connected. Honoring the dead dates to prehistoric times and finds expression in various parts of the world, with tributes given to deceased loved ones and veneration of those most worthy offered on the day of their birth. In the pre-Christian Celtic religion, November 1 and 2 were the celebration of their new year, when dead souls would return for a visit.

From the beginnings of the Church, Christians have cherished the memory of those martyred for the faith as icons of Jesus Christ. The small shrines built where the martyrs' remains were buried became places of prayer and pilgrimage. On the anniversary of a martyr's death, the *dies natales*, or birth into the new and heavenly Jerusalem, was commemorated at the tomb, with Eucharist celebrated at dawn on their graves. The martyrs became venerated as disciples and imitators of Christ.

All the saints are celebrated each year on November 1; however, most Christian traditions of honoring the dead are linked with All Souls Day on November 2. On this day, we remember our own loved ones who have gone before us in faith. These tributes extend beyond the day itself and last through the month of November, the Month of All Souls. The days are now at their darkest; crops have been harvested; leaves have changed colors and are falling to the ground; the weather turns cold and bitter, while the readings of the liturgy direct our thoughts to the end times, when Christ will return in his full glory restoring the fullness of salvation to all of creation. What a perfect time to remember our beloved dead!



#### THE BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD

During the Month of All Souls, we give a place of honor to a book in which community members and visitors write the names of their beloved dead. *The Book of the Names of the Dead* was inspired by the ancient practice of recording the dates of the deaths of loved ones in a necrology, a public record or registry of death. This practice provides the living with an opportunity for healing and consolation in the face of grief.

The Book of the Names of the Dead will be displayed from the solemnity of All Saints until the beginning of Advent. It is left open for people to write the names of their deceased loved ones and for others to read the names, remember, and pray for the repose of their souls *The Book of the Names of the Dead* will be in the front of the church, in the area of the tabernacle.

Remembering all of these men and women who have gone before us, "marked with the sign of faith," helps us better understand and appreciate our faith in the Christ our risen Lord who conquers sin and death and brings new life to all.
