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

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR



Hi everyone! I hope you had a very blessed Thanksgiving week! I have always enjoyed Thanksgiving since it allows me some time off. Christmas and Easter are definitely the greatest holidays since they celebrate our Savior but there is a lot of time and work that goes into those celebrations! This past weekend I went to Philadelphia to run the Philadelphia marathon. I have been in the habit of training over the summers and running two marathons in the fall. This fall I ran Akron in late September and Philadelphia a week ago. I was really impressed with the Philadelphia marathon. There were around 10,000 runners which made for lots of great competition the whole way through the race. One of my favorite parts of the race was around mile 20. By this point in the race each runner is just ready to be done and collapse and you still have 6.2 miles to go. I was beginning to feel that way as we made our way down to mile 20 and at this point the course had us turn around and head back into the city for the final stretch. What I did not expect was to see an incredible number of fans cheering us on at the turn-around (it had been pretty quiet with spectators for the past several miles) and they had the Rocky Balboa theme song blasting. This gave us runners the inspiration and strength the push those last 6 miles to the finish. And I am very happy to say I did set my personal record (PR) at 2:56 (2 hours and 56 minutes). took two minutes off my previous best which I was very happy with at 36 years old. I am not sure how much more I can take off that time but, God-willing, will give it my best for these next few years!

On a different note, and a more important one, this weekend closes our liturgical year. We finish the year with a great liturgical celebration of Christ the King! The Church acknowledges and proclaims Jesus as the King of the Universe. This feast was originally instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925 in response to the growing amount of secularism and atheism. I think its easy to look at the early 20th century with rose-colored glasses as if faith was not a problem in "those days." But clearly there were real signs of faith being pushed out the door and secularism taking over. I think we would all agree we see this pretty powerfully in our day today. There has been an ongoing trend for society to push away from Christian values and morals and to adopt a more and more secular way of thinking. We see this in very real ways in the past few decades. Generally speaking Sunday Mass attendance is down significantly and replaced by sports or laziness, abortion laws have increased, marriage has been "redefined" and the list goes on. If we are honest, secularization has been strong.

Pope Pius reminds us by instituting this feast that we not only believe Jesus is King but we proclaim Christ as King. It can be easy to always be on the defense with our faith. People challenge us for our beliefs and way of thinking all the time. There is nothing wrong with defending the



faith, for anything it can be a good thing. But we are called as Christians, not just to play defense but to play well on offense. On this feast and as we close the Church year, we are reminded to really proclaim our faith not just always defend it. Please never forget, every person is searching for God whether they realize it or not. Every person has a deep, deep hunger for the love of God written within their hearts. Is all you and I have to do is help awaken that hunger and thirst that already exists. In a way its like helping people connect the dots in their lives. It is true that we should not force faith or guilt people with faith. We should have genuinely good human interaction and conversation about our beliefs and not be afraid to share our own testimony. And we can help people make connections in their lives. Is someone feeling lost that you know? Encourage them to pray or even better, pray with them. Has someone been caught in grave sin that you know and is looking for a way out? Share the story of the prodigal son or the 99 and the 1 from Luke's Gospel where Jesus seeks and saves the lost. Maybe encourage someone to return to confession this Advent. Or consider handing them a Advent devotional book to prepare for Christmas. Just remember everyone is searching for God. You already have that working with you while helping people come to Christ. Again, this feast reminds us - Jesus Christ is the King! We are meant not just to remember this but to proclaim it!





Northeast Ohio's Online Day of Catholic Giving

Today we end the Church's liturgical year with the Feast of Christ the King. All the readings center in some way on service to others. Christ, who went about doing good, is our model for living. If we want to walk in His footsteps, we must look for opportunities to help people in need. This past week we celebrated Thanksgiving and if we watched the news recently, we saw many people helping others. The tragic bus accident with students on their way to a conference, TV stations collecting food for the homeless and the hungry, our Christmas trees in the breezeway with gifts of hope hanging on each limb, for food kitchens looking for monetary help and the many needs of our own parish family and our St. Vincent De Paul group who are always being of service to others in need. So, if we want to enter Heaven, service is one way that we might get there. We have to lift up others in prayer and by doing acts of mercy. C.S. Lewis wrote an essay that might surprise us. One of the first things he said was: we would be surprised at the amount of people in heaven. Secondly: we would be shocked that there are people that we never would have thought would be there. And third: we would be surprised that there were people we expected to be in heaven who were not there, and finally we would be surprised that we were there. Christ went about doing good and so must we. He has blessed us to be able to share what we have with others. It is in imitation of Jesus' works of mercy that we become one with Jesus. Saint Mother Theresa lived her life ministering to the poor. Her thoughts for reflection today are: "I was thirsty, not for drink but for a sign of friendship. I was hungry for a smile and you smiled at me. I was a stranger and you made me feel welcome. Each of us could add our own encounter with the Lord. So, during these last twelve months we have followed the life of Jesus from Advent, through his birth, mission, death and resurrection. Now, at the conclusion of this liturgical year we beg Him to help us recognize Him in our world and to acknowledge His presence by reaching out to Him in the face of others. Christ is indeed our King and we bow down in worship.

Notes from the Blue Army

Catholic author, Kathleen Beckman shares the following: "In 2000 our son was a teenager going through a very rough time. I could see the spirit of the world trying to pull him away from our family and take him into a dark world. I began to pray the rosary specifically for our son to be delivered away from all the bad influences and temptations that were pulling him down. I prayed the Glorious Mysteries because I was interceding for my son's resurrection. While meditating on the Glorious Mysteries, I claimed for my son the grace of each mystery. I prayed with deep confidence that this Rosary was pleasing to God. I somehow knew that He would hear and answer this prayer. I continued this rosary novena for my son's healing and deliverance for one year. I could not see improvement. In fact things seemed to get worse. My prayer only became more fervent and my faith increased that God would rescue him. I never doubted but it was difficult. Then God moved. He sent my older son home from Europe. He saw the difficulties that his younger brother was undergoing. He approached me immediately stating that there is a serious problem here. I shared with my older son that neither I nor my husband could reach him no matter what we tried. Our oldest son went into his room for a long time and emerged with a letter to his younger brother. He entered his younger brother's room and read the letter slowly to him. Our older son had written a long list of positive attributes about his brother, all the things that were loveable about him. His brother's list was a statement of truth. His brother provided a mirror of his true selfidentity. For a while he had lost the image of his true self as he entered an arena of deception, an arena that is the downfall of many young people. My two sons went to the movies together. At the end of that day our son was healed and delivered. I assure you that this was a big deliverance from the influence of the Evil One on my family. It was the power of a brother's love that overcame the power of evil that had a grip on our son. But it was the power of a mother's prayer, specifically the Holy Rosary, that was the catalyst behind the events that led to the healing and deliverance of our son. I was simply the mother and intercessor with Mary, praying the Holy Rosary to prepare the soil of my son's heart to receive the flood of grace that would come through his brother — not through me or my husband. I have no doubt my son's healing and deliverance was the fruit of the one year novena of the Holy Rosary."

REMEMBERING THE DEAD



The names of the deceased are seen on holy cards, memorial cards, and grave markers. Masses are prayed for the repose of souls. These rituals and practices serve to keep the memory of those who have gone before us in faith present in our minds and hearts

MONTH OF ALL SOULS

The origins of the solemnity of All Saints (November 1) and the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls Day, November 2) are connected. Honoring the dead dates to prehistoric times and finds expression in various parts of the world, with tributes given to deceased loved ones and veneration of those most worthy offered on the day of their birth. In the pre-Christian Celtic religion, November 1 and 2 were the celebration of their new year, when dead souls would return for a visit.

From the beginnings of the Church, Christians have cherished the memory of those martyred for the faith as icons of Jesus Christ. The small shrines built where the martyrs' remains were buried became places of prayer and pilgrimage. On the anniversary of a martyr's death, the dies natales, or birth into the new and heavenly Jerusalem, was commemorated at the tomb, with Eucharist celebrated at dawn on their graves. The martyrs became venerated as disciples and imitators of Christ.

All the saints are celebrated each year on November 1; however, most Christian traditions of honoring the dead are linked with All Souls Day on November 2. On this day, we remember our own loved ones who have gone before us in faith. These tributes extend beyond the day itself and last through the month of November, the Month of All Souls. The days are now at their darkest; crops have been harvested; leaves have changed colors and are falling to the ground; the weather turns cold and bitter, while the readings of the liturgy direct our thoughts to the end times, when Christ will return in his full glory restoring the fullness of salvation to all of creation. What a perfect time to remember our beloved dead!



THE BOOK OF THE NAMES OF THE DEAD

During the Month of All Souls, we give a place of honor to a book in which community members and visitors write the names of their beloved dead. The Book of the Names of the Dead was inspired by the ancient practice of recording the dates of the deaths of loved ones in a necrology, a public record or registry of death. This practice provides the living with an opportunity for healing and consolation in the face of grief.

The Book of the Names of the Dead will be displayed from the solemnity of All Saints until the beginning of Advent. It is left open for people to write the names of their deceased loved ones and for others to read the names, remember, and pray for the repose of their souls The Book of the Names of the Dead will be in the front of the church, in the area of the tabernacle.

Remembering all of these men and women who have gone before us, "marked with the sign of faith," helps us better understand and appreciate our faith in the Christ our risen Lord who conquers sin and death and brings new life to all.

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


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
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
