

A Message from our Pastor



Hi, everyone! I hope you enjoy this long holiday weekend. There continue to be some very exciting things going on at St. Barnabas. A few weeks back we had our third outdoor Mass and we really had a wonderful turnout. It was very hot that day but everyone seemed to handle it well. An invitation was sent out to the 8thgraders to come with their families for a blessing and I was thrilled to see the turnout. We also had many, many people stay after for food and fellowship. It continues to give me great joy to see people enjoy being here for Mass and spending time together to grow in community. Our 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. attendance at Masses has been increasing and it's really good to see people responding to the call to come back to Church on Sundays, worship Jesus together, and give Him our lives and week ahead. I invited the CYO coaches to bring their kids to Mass on a more regular basis and told them to have the kids wear their jerseys. We had some come last weekend which was great to see! Lastly, this past weekend we also had a very busy campus with CYO games. Volleyball, soccer and football were all going on at once. I even had a funeral in the midst of all the activity. It is great to see a lively campus and many people here!

In this weekend's Gospel we get the follow-up from last weekend, except the tone from Jesus sounds very different. Last weekend Jesus asked the Apostles, "Who do you say that I am?" And Peter boldly answered, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Then Jesus made Peter the rock on which He would build His Church and gave Peter the keys to the Kingdom to "bind and loose"! This was a tremendous affirmation of Peter and the authority given to him and his successors to lead and guide the Church down through the centuries.

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus begins to teach the Apostles about how He will save the world and how the Kingdom of God will grow. Jesus explains that He will suffer, die and rise. Peter, now feeling confident from his previous conversation with Jesus and the outcome, now steps up boldly again to tell Jesus that would never happen to him. This time Jesus calls Peter "Satan" and explains that he is thinking the way human beings do, not the way God does. In the first encounter Peter spoke truth revealed by the Spirit and the second time Peter spoke in arrogance as if he knew better than God.

I think it's fair to say we do this, too. Sometimes we speak beautifully in the Holy Spirit and in faith and love. And this helps build God's kingdom. And in other times we think we know better than God and try to prevent His will or act in a way contrary to His plan. On a very simple level you may feel this way in your daily family life. Sometimes you say things to your kids or spouse that may be challenging them but help them grow, and other times it's just anger or bitterness coming out that solves and helps nothing and no one. In this way and in other ways we can be like Peter more than we may realize.

The reality is - Peter is an imperfect vessel. Jesus knows this and still chooses to work through him. Jesus did not take back the keys from Peter because of his arrogance but corrected him and moved on. We are imperfect vessels, too. We cannot possibly do everything just right. God in His great wisdom can still use imperfect vessels to fulfill His perfect plan. God will correct us, too, and help us to move forward. We should be humble enough to receive that from Him and learn from our mistakes.

As Pope Francis and Bishop Malesic often say – the Church is meant to be made up of imperfect people. We should not be surprised when we see imperfection in our brothers and sisters in Christ. God chooses to work through our imperfections and still masterfully builds His kingdom. It was important for Peter to learn and grow. It is important for us to learn and grow as well on our journey of faith.

How has Jesus worked through your imperfections in your life? Share that with someone this week.

COMMUNITY What a difference between 50+ Peter in the Gospel last Sunday when Peter proclaimed that Jesus was the Messiah to today's Gospel when he takes Jesus aside to


try to convince him that facing suffering, death and dying must never happen to him. What a difference in Jesus' response to Peter last week when he made Peter the head of the Church to today when he calls Peter a stumbling block. Most of us like the scripture stories that appeal to us. We like stories about Christ's birth and infancy, His getting lost and then found in the temple, the Emmaus journey, His healing miracles, but we might leave out today's Gospel. Taking up the cross, losing our lives for the sake of Jesus are not quite as inviting. So what does the Lord want from us? What does He mean by "carrying your cross?" A simple answer might be putting up with what cannot be changed in our lives. We cannot understand why we have a cross. Sometimes we want to challenge God. Sometimes we want to bargain with Him. Peter wanted Jesus but not the cross and sometimes we would also like to avoid the cross as well. What changed? Peter had fallen in love with God. His faith in Jesus grew so that he no longer acted on impulse but under the power of the Holy Spirit. He accepted the cross to live a new life in union with Jesus. We are so much like Peter. We will eventually accept Jesus' words: "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." And, have we fallen in love with Jesus as well?

Notes from the Blue Army: Catholic blogger, Kathy Schiffer, tells about the Sisters of Baby Mary or Maria Bambina. The Sisters of Charity or, more commonly, the Sisters of Maria Bambina, are caretakers of a wax statue of the Holy Child Mary which was carved in 1730 by a Franciscan nun. The Sisters of Charity accepted responsibility for a hospital in Milan, and in 1867, they moved the waxen image of Maria Bambina to their Motherhouse there. The wax statue was exposed for veneration each year on Sept. 8, the Nativity of the Virgin Mary. On September 7 in 1884, Sr. Josephine, who was bedridden due to paralysis and was in unbearable pain, asked the Mother General to permit the statue to remain with her overnight; and despite the gravity of her illness, Sr. Josephine was healed. The Mother General took the Image, which after so many years was gray and worn, to the other sick sisters in the infirmary so that they could kiss her. There in the infirmary a bedridden novice, Giulia Macario, caressed the doll lovingly and prayed to Mary for her recovery. At once, Giulia was miraculously cured; at the same time the statue, which had become old and gray, was itself amazingly transformed from its former gray color to warm pink flesh tones. The bright colors have remained to the present day, and the statue can be viewed in the Sanctuary of the Motherhouse in Milan. For this reason, the Sisters of Charity came to be popularly known as the Baby Mary Sisters.




